

have become so self-absorbed in this individualistic and materialistic enterprise, that we have forgotten to share the reason for the season?

Recently, I came across a writing of Thomas Merton, a Trappists monk, called more formally Cistercians of the Strict Observance. While attending an international conference on Christian and Buddhist monasticism in Bangkok, Thailand, he was accidentally electrocuted on December 10th, 1968. (There is no mention of him being an Episcopalian who lived in the Diocese of Long Island and attended Zion Douglaston before conversion.) He wrote "It is not enough for love to be shared: it must be shared freely. That is to say it must be given, not merely taken. Unselfish love that is poured out upon a selfish object does not bring perfect happiness: not because love requires a return or reward for loving, but because it rests in the happiness of the beloved. And if the one loved receives selfishly, the lover is not satisfied. The lover sees that his or her love has failed to make the beloved happy. It has not awakened the capacity for unselfish love. Hence the paradox that unselfish love cannot rest perfectly in a love that is perfectly reciprocated: because it knows that the only true peace is found in selfless love. Selfless love consents to be loved selflessly for the sake of the beloved. In so doing, it perfects itself. He concludes, "If we know God, our identification of ourselves with those we love will be patterned on our union with God and subordinated to it. Thus, our love will begin with the knowledge of its limitations and rise to the awareness of its greatness. For in ourselves we will always remain separate and remote from one another, but in God we can be one with those we love. We cannot find them in God without first perfectly finding ourselves in him; therefore, we will take care not to lose ourselves in looking for them outside of him. For love is not found in the void that exists between our being and the being of the one we love.... We are obliged to love one another. We are not strictly bound to "like" one another. Love governs the will; "liking" is a matter of sense and sensibility. Nevertheless, if we really love others it will not be too hard to like them also. If we wait for some people to become agreeable or attractive before we begin to love them, we will never begin. If we are content to give them a cold, impersonal "charity" that is merely a matter of obligation, we will not trouble to try to understand them or to sympathize with them at all. And in that case, we will not really love them, because love implies an efficacious will not only to do good to others exteriorly but also to find some good in them to which we can respond." What is Merton trying to tell us? I am sure he is not challenging us about love of self; but how do we respond to the other with selfless love which God has showered us. How do we respond to God's love by selflessly loving the other?

My beloved in Christ, I invite us in this season of preparation, to heed John the Baptist's call to return to the wilderness. It may be a place of quiet, a place of repentance, a place of shedding the layers and walls, so we can make room for the gift of Love to embolden us. We can be transformed. In turn, we can transform the world through caring for the least, the marginalized, the destitute, the stranger and the oppressed with the gift of Love that comes to enlighten the Gentiles and fill our hearts with the joy that our Redeemer is here.

I pray this Advent season may be filled with opportunities of holy preparation and waiting. I pray your Christmastide may be illuminated with grace, peace, joy and happiness. I pray and invite you to share your gift of Love with others.

ccording to the National Institute of Neurological Disorders and Stroke (NINDS), lower back pain is the leading cause of job-related disability. Back pain can reduce the quality of life for many persons causing them to miss out on work and social activities and prevent them from undertaking daily tasks. While not all back pain can be avoided, there are certain steps that can be taken to prevent problems later on.

- Exercise and maintain a healthy weight with safe aerobic activity such as walking, bicycling, swimming and yoga.
- Engage in stretches to strengthen the abdominal and back muscles and warm up before exercise.
- Maintain good posture while walking and sitting at the computer making adjustments to your chair and computer screen and using proper lumbar support.
- Avoid lifting heavy objects and use correct bending techniques.
- Use supportive mattress and pillow.
- Use relaxation techniques for tensed back and neck muscles.
- Treat strains and sprains with rest, ice, compression and elevation.

Ministry Spotlight

Eucharistic Ministers

he Eucharistic minister/chalice assistant assists the priest with the distribution of the sacraments during the Holy Communion service. In our diocese, the Eucharistic minister stays in the church and the Eucharistic visitor takes the sacraments to the sick and shut in.

In our church, the Eucharistic minister prepares the altar (prayer and gospel book) and the credence table with the vessels, prior to the service and clears them at the end of the service. During the offertory they can hand the vessels to the priest as he readies the altar for the mass. At the administration of the sacrament, the chalice is given to the Eucharistic minister for distribution. When all are served, the chalice and purificator (cloth that wipes the chalice) are given to the priest who passes the ciborium with blessed sacraments, to be returned to the tabernacle.

The Eucharistic minister can give the water for rinsing the vessels, to the priest as he prepares them to return to the credence table.

The Eucharistic ministers are vested and process with the choir and clergy. Hand sanitizer is used. The chalice is held around the base so that the congregants can grasp the base and tip the cup towards the mouth. After the wine is given there is a small turn as the cup is wiped. For those who do not drink from the cup the host remains in the palm of the hand where it is removed, dipped in the cup and placed on the tongue.

Eucharistic ministers are approved by the priest and licensed by the Bishop. Currently, training is done in the parish and information is forwarded to the Bishop for licensing.

INSTRUCTIONS

- Preheat oven to 350 degrees; lined a pan with baking paper and set aside
- Mix butter on medium speed until creamy in the bowl of an electric mixer fitted with the paddle attachment
- Add 2/3 cup powdered sugar and salt, mix well.
- Add in vanilla, cornstarch and finely shredded coconut.
- Continue mixing on low speed gradually adding flour and mix until evenly combine.
- Scoop 1 Tbsp dough at a time and roll into a ball, place balls on lined baking paper.
- Bake about 16 18 minutes
 (until bottoms get light golden color)
- Remove from the oven, cool a few minutes and while cookies are still warm roll them in powdered and let them on a wire rack to cool completely and then roll them in powdered sugar once again, to coat them generously.




THE TREE OF LIFE

He has been a member of St. Peter's, and the Men's Guild since 1991, serving as a Vice President and President. Over the past 27 years he has been involved in a number of other ministries, such as the Choir, Lay Reader, Eucharistic minister/ Chalice assistant, and Vestry member. Dr. Campbell held membership in the original Health ministry, but could not continue when it reformed as the St. Luke's Guild. Over the years, he has also been able to devote time to attend and lead Bible Study.

Mrs. Cynthia Craig: Due to her dedicated years of service and willingness, organizing several special events including the fellowship hour after the 10:00 AM Mass, Father's Day Luncheon, Harvest Supper and Chairperson of the fellowship committee, Mrs. Craig has been chosen by her fellow committee members to be honored. Despite Mrs. Craig's busy work schedule, she still found time for church and has been actively involved in several organizations since becoming a member of St. Peter's. Mrs. Evelyn Irving: Mrs. Irving has worshipped with her family at St. Peter's for over 30 years. Mrs. Irving is responsible for starting the St. Peter's Youth group in the late 1980's and served as Director until the early 2000's. Barbara is deeply committed and involved in the work of St. Peter's Church. She served for two terms as a Vestry member and was part of the search committee for the calling of the VI Rector.
